With restored concession fees threatening to sink iTV, there is not much in the English-language press about the significance of the station. Even the <u>The Nation's chronology of iTV</u> principally covers events from the Thaksin era.

After iTV was created in 1995 to be an independent source of news in the broadcast media world, it became the talk of the town for its investigative journalism of sensitive subjects such as exposing the <u>Naga fireballs</u> and the <u>gem scam</u>, using hidden camera to show policeman taking bribes from motorists, and highlighting the sexual exploits of famous monks. Nothing like this had ever been shown on Thai TV before.

Incisive newscasting on TV broke Thai norms. Print media is open to all manner of sensational reporting, but television is considered as an overly influential medium and is usually under the yoke of military or government influence. The vapid soap operas of Thai TV that typically reinforce traditional forms of interaction and expression are part of this idea that TV should be a pacifying and not a controversial medium.

iTV always lost money and even during the Democrat-led government era, iTV was accused of colluding with the government to circumvent concession fees.

It is not surprising that Thaksin's Thai Rak Thai, which attempted to bring all aspects of the Thai state under its control, would see iTV as another media outlet to be targeted for absorption or closure. The rest of the Thai word also wanted this pesky news outlet humbled. Its open exposure and ridicule of officials through its hidden camera reports struck at the heart of Thai concepts of "face" that one is supposed to maintain, whether doing right or wrong.

<u>Taming the media</u> – *Asiaweek*, February 16, 2001

...The ITV controversy, which started with Thepchai's ouster, blew open on Jan. 12 when 20 of his former colleagues at the station, led by managing editor Jira Hongsamrerng, went public with charges that pressure had been applied on them to do stories favorable to Thai Rak Thai and Thaksin's Shin Corp. business empire. "There was so much intervention by the executives, so much political interference," says Jira. After the whistle-blowing, Jira was called in for a meeting with his bosses. "They told me I had a problem, because what I had done was to the detriment of ITV. They said I was wrong to tell the public. And there on the table was the resignation form. I was forced to resign."

Similar allegations have been forthcoming from another television station, Channel 3. Popular TV commentator Kasemsant Weerakun recently announced that he and his news team had quit the station following pressure to toe the Thai Rak Thai line. "Almost every morning, my staff would get calls saying, don't say anything negative about Thai Rak Thai and Thaksin," he charges...

Is the end really near? – March 20, 2006

The Thai press has been telling its readers over the past few weeks that Prime Minister Thaksin will be stepping down any day now, but it has become increasingly clear Thaksin will not budge and is deftly responding to public expectations.

Thaksin has been raising public hopes he might step down at times when anti-Thaksin sentiment is high—and then shortly afterwards he clarifies the statement to indicate he will not step down. This cycle has been repeated many times over the last three weeks and has effectively kept pro- and anti-Thaksin forces, as well as other institutions that might mitigate the crisis, at bay. This is also an effective way of keeping Thaksin's internal enemies off balance.

The slow, gradual way the pro-Thaksin farmers were brought into town follows this tactic as well. First the movement of the farmers raised tensions that a showdown was on the way. Then it was announced they would be staying outside of town. Then they were on the move again <u>finally ending up in Chatuchak Park</u>. In between these movements were various pronouncements, just at times fears were highest, that the sides would not be allowed to clash.

Ultimately, maneuvering the protesters into Bangkok in an opposing venue shows Thaksin is serious in contending he will not allow "the mob" (as a Thai press puts it) to force him out of office. (The appearance of a pro-Thaksin group also plays well in the foreign press which almost universally has a simplistic reading of Thai political events based on Western models.)

This adept use of information and public opinion is in keeping with Thaksin's skill in public opinion and indicates, despite continual assertions in the press (at least in the Thai-language press and *The Nation*), that Thaksin fully intends to stay. It is likely that internal dissension with Thai Rak Thai party is lessened now that Thaksin has shown he will not bow to traditional political norms and allow a Bangkok-based "elite" to declare he has lost the legitimacy to rule.

The fact that we are halfway through March and Thaksin is still in power is a testament to his skills and is probably making the opposition–particularly the political bigwigs who broke with Thaksin–feeling a bit desperate.

This means that the desire for and reaction to untoward or violent incidents would be high. Both sides will have to choose their moves carefully as the line between success and failure is very fine. A likely upcoming event could be the postponement of the election (hints of this have been trickling out for several weeks), but this would still allow Thaksin to hang on as P.M.

Beyond the business of politics – Chang Noi, March 20, 2006

...Private business-owners account for only 3 percent of Thailand's working population, but they occupy about 70 to 80 percent of the seats in parliament.

Over-representation of one group — especially on such a staggering scale — means under-representation of everybody else. Only 2 percent of MPs claim to be farmers, and none is truly representative of the small farmers who are the single largest segment of the population. Only a couple of MPs are representative of the small-scale family businesses and others in the urban informal sector who are the second largest population group. There's not one from the private business employees who are the third largest.

RP and Thailand - different systems, different outcomes? - Manila Bulletin, March 18, 2006

...As a consistent proponent for meaningful reform through Charter change, it is my belief that Thailand will probably have an easier time than the Philippines in overcoming each other's political crisis. Compared to our presidential form of government, Thailand's parliamentary system offers a non-violent, legal, and constitutional alternative: The "confidence or no-confidence" vote, to effect regime change without the need for police-military intervention. The Philippine system, in contrast, may lead to the fragmentation of our armed services, the adoption of extra-legal measures, and the eventuality of bloody civil strife.

Within six months, Thailand could again be "up and away," while the Philippines may still be stuck in stalemate up to 2010 and even beyond.

<u>Thailand protests put Asia's democratic ideal at crossroads</u> – Sydney Morning Herald, March 17, 2006 "Thaksin aok bai." What happens then is an open question. Amid the clamour, concerns are quietly being raised on whether Thailand's new protest movement could be throwing the baby out with the bathwater in its unwavering desire to unseat the Prime Minister.

"I am very concerned; this is unprecedented," said Thitinan Pongsudhirak, who teaches political science at Chulalongkorn University in Bangkok. "This has the potential to undermine Thailand ... We have had mass movements in 1973 and 1992. But this is a democratically elected prime minister who remains popular..."





The exposure of Laloh commune in the red zone after school teacher shooting – translated and summarized from Thai Journalists Association, July 24, 2006

The shooting of Prasan Makchu, a school teacher at Ban Bueraeng school situated in Moo 1 of Laloh commune in the Rueso district of Narathiwat on 24 July was not the first crime against school teachers and other government officers working in the area. It is one of the most dangerous areas and has a high frequency of violence and crimes that have continuously occurred over the past two years.

On January 29, an armed band of at least 10 militants with AK and M16 rifles killed 2 navy personnel at Laloh railway station. For this crime, police detained 2 suspects for interrogation. On May 10, villagers held the two female school teachers, Juling Pongkunmul and her friend for bargaining with authorities. The incident finally ended in a tragedy that saddened the entire country. When the largest bomb crime in the south recently occurred, Laloh railway station was the targeted place. Fortunately there were no injuries.

Laloh has never been clear of violence and crimes during the past 2 years. In 2005 alone, a total of 10 crimes were committed. The crimes varied and included shooting attacks with guns or rifles by combatants on motorcycles. There were raids on an army unit located in the area of Ban Thai Suk temple, bombardments of government offices, bomb attacks on security forces, etc. These incidents caused damage to property and many deaths, not only to civilians but also government officers.

All these dangerous crimes committed in Laloh area are believed to be supported by a powerful member of the BRN (Barasi Revolusi Nasional) Coordinate group. He is reported by intelligence sources to be Usoh, also known as Sofh Toh-Luenoh and Ustas Soh as per the police arrest warrant.

Ustas Soh has the position of regional chief and his responsibility covers Laloh commune, Rueso commune, Rueso district, Tammayong commune, Chengkiri commune and Srisakorn district, all in Narathiwat province. He is the direct commander of Permudor or The Youth for Pattani United divisions of BRN Coordinate.

Laloh needs to be carefully watched as it is one of the most dangerous areas in the list hazardous places and seemingly draws special attention as can be seen from the history of continuous violence and crimes.

What the disappeared leave behind – Bangkok Post, July 9, 2006

Southern Thailand 40 years ago – A different viewpoint from a foreign researcher – translated and summarized from the Thai Journalist's Association News, article by Supaporn Kanjanaweerayothin, July 16, 2006

It was almost 40 years ago that Professor M. Ladd Thomas of the University of Northern Illinois visited Thailand for 10 months. Thomas interviewed local villagers and administrators in 120 villages in Thailand's three southernmost provinces for his research submission to the National Research Council on "Malay Muslims and their attitude towards economic and social development."

Professor Thomas is now back in Thailand to update his research. Here is some information from his original research to allow us to compare the past and present of the region. Thomas's pre-research preparation involved studying the Malay language for 3 months so that he could effectively interview ordinary local residents. He interviewed three or four families in each of 120 villages before finalizing his research conclusions.

Thomas's research showed that Southern Thai Muslims main concern was their local education system. The second most important issue for them was the state of local roads and infrastructure and the third was the local medical system. Thomas reported no violence during his research period. Most locals appeared to lead a peaceful life despite the nearby presence of forces of the Communism Party of Malaysia (CPM). The CPM was largely engaged in its struggle with the Malaysian authorities and rarely came into conflict with the Thai armed forces at that time. Thomas noticed that the local Malay population detested government officials. These officials often referred to them as 'khaek'—a derogatory Thai term reserved for Indians and others who supposedly resembled Indians. Government officials often used this term for local villagers with no apparent thought that it might cause offense.

Thomas also discovered that none of the policemen working in the southern provinces were able to speak Malay despite it being the native language of the majority of the local population. He also found that none of the villagers he questioned could speak Thai—not even the village headmen . This greatly limited the communication between local residents and their administrators. The last resort for many villagers was the Kamnan who could sometimes speak Thai. Kamnans were usually the first contact when local residents wanted to communicate with the police. None of the questioned villagers reported receiving even the slightest satisfaction from visiting a police station.

Apart from the communication difficulties, there was another obstacle to the local relationship between policemen and villagers. It was also locally perceived that justice could only be obtained by those paying "private" fees to policemen. It was also perceived that there was no sincerity in the service provided by government officials. This was the original reason why local people were loath to inform government officials of their plight. Instead, they took such problems to their village headmen or local Islamic religious leaders.

The infrastructure in the southern region 40 years ago was not very well-developed and there were great difficulties traveling from place to place. Police would usually make only an annual visit to some villages and only the Deputy District Chief usually had a jeep to travel around his patch. Only a few low-ranking officials bothered to learn to speak Malay. Such officials soon found themselves able to socialize with local people and often voiced their appreciation of the generosity of the villagers to their visitors.

Muslim leaders disagree with NSC idea to close down "tadika" schools fearing further unrest may result – translated and summarized from *Krungtep Turakit*, July 19, 2006

The director of a ponoh and a prominent academic have recently voiced their disagreement with the National Security Council (NSC) plan to close down "tadika" schools in the three southernmost provinces with both critics saying they fear that local unrest might intensify as a result of this policy.

Abdulrohni Kahama, Secretary-General of Islamic Boarding Schools Association in the five southernmost provinces, says that the NSC's plan is not at all practical, as the local unrest will intensify if these schools are closed down. Many other organizations also disagree with the plan, as do the mosques in which a number of the tadika schools are based. Abdulrohni believes that the government's problem-solving strategies are not addressing the real issues behind the unrest. He points out that the tadika schools are now under the supervision of the Ministry of Education which theoretically makes it impossible to close them down. He also wants the government to stop thinking of tadika schools as places for insurgents to gather.

Ahmad Somboon Bualuang, a prominent academic and former National Reconciliation Committee member, recently described the NSC plan as ridiculous. He described how tadika school curricula are different from those of ordinary schools as they teach Islamic religious belief and practice. He noted that tadika schools are already carefully supervised by both their relevant Provincial Islamic Committee and the Ministry of Education, and warned that government closure of the schools could lead to a huge reduction in social prestige for local Islamic leaders. He felt that this might intensify the unrest in the region. He suggested that the government still had a lot to learn about the educational system in the deep south.

Big Trouble In Thailand - Yahoo, July 26, 2006

Last year, authorities found a video of an al-Qaida training session among items seized at a school in Pattani. Some of the terrorists have attended al-Qaida camps in Afghanistan and Pakistan. They may have sanctuary across the border in northern Malaysia, with groups tied to Jemaah Islamiyah, an al-Qaida-linked terror group that blew up Western tourist spots in Bali in 2002 and 2005...

The U.S. must respond in kind. We must show unequivocal support for Bangkok in its efforts against becoming al-Qaida's next domino. More U.S. military aid and training should also be in order.

Much is at stake. Al-Qaida, which recently seized Somalia, already has its claws in Indonesia, Malaysia, the Philippines, Bangladesh and Pakistan.

If terrorists weaken Thailand's government, al-Qaida would have a major footprint in Southeast Asia. Does the world want that?

Tracing the strategies of bombers – translated and summarized from *Komchadluek*, July 7, 2006 The southern unrest has intensified in terms of the types of bombs used by the insurgents. Army Commander-in-Chief General Sonthi Boonyaratklin has recently been assigned to tackle the southern unrest after the recent occurrence of fifty simultaneous bombings in the three southern border provinces. General Sonthi is reported to be concerned about bomb attacks that target the vehicles of government officials as they are hard to prevent and often cause serious injuries and extensive damage.

Police Major General Amporn Charuchinda, a bomb expert, has recently reported that most of the bombs used in the deep south are homemade—having been made from materials commonly used in the mining industry. He added that he has yet to detect high-grade military explosives being used by the region's terrorists.

However, Amporn warned that most militants were usually capable of improving the quality of

their explosive devices in the long term. Amporn described how, as recently as 2004, militants had packed urea-based bombs into plastic food containers. These bombs were not as powerful as those made from dynamite, but were still capable of inflicting fatal injuries.

The bombers have more recently replaced urea with ammonium nitrate and have also begun packing their devices into metal containers. The newer bombs are, inevitably, more powerful than those made from urea.

Early in 2005, the terrorists began making far more powerful bombs from fire extinguishers. The blast of these bombs is sufficient to totally wreck road vehicles and railroad tracks. So far, the authorities have noted the use of 60 fire extinguisher bombs by the terrorists.

>From 2004 until August 2005, bombers were usually able to plant bombs with impunity in any area of the region they chose. The bombs were usually detonated by a call to an attached mobile phone or by command wire. The militants have changed their strategy since September 2005 as they now ambush the survivors of their bomb attacks.

The number of terrorist bomb attacks increased from 106 in 2004, to 273 in 2005. To date this year, 118 explosions have been reported.

Three arrested bombing suspects have confessed that some bombs have been imported from Malaysia while others are produced in Thailand. They also confessed that the aims of their attacks were to destroy people's confidence in the government, kill security and government personnel, intimidate local people and destroy the local economy. Their overarching aim was to intimidate Thai Buddhists into relocating out of the region.

Sonthi attempting to separate militants from innocents – Locals still fear arbitrary arrest – translated and summarized by *Komchadluek*, July 5, 2006

Caretaker Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra recently handed the Royal Thai Army Commander-in-Chief Sonthi Boonyaratklin a mandate to quell the current unrest in the deep south. General Sonthi recently traveled to Pattani Province to discuss the current problems in the southern border provinces. General Sonthi is insisting on the implementation of his policy of finding ways to separate militants from innocent local citizens.

Nimi Makaje, a former President of the Islamic Committee of Yala Province, recently urged the government to arrest only "known" militants and not those who are only suspected. It has been reported that some high-level government officials are still making arbitrary arrests.

RTAF joins hands with other armed forces to solve the southern insurgency – translated and summarized by *Phujatkan*, July 6, 2006

Air Chief Marshal Chalit Pukbhasuk, Commander-in-Chief of the Royal Thai Air Force (RTAF), recently informed the media about the service's support for efforts to solve the southern insurgency. Personnel from air force bases have been promptly pressed into service as reinforcements for ground forces in the south and even ground-support staff have been assigned to such duties.

The RTAF security base at Bo Thong has also been fully re-equipped. The Pattani base is used for intelligence-gathering, but is now taking on a new role as a center for the rapid and smooth deployment of reinforcements when difficult situations arise.

General Chalit also informed the media that, to ensure the smooth running of effective missions, most of the air force officers deployed in the region are originally from the south. These officers are also given longer term tours-of-duty than is common elsewhere in the country. Air force personnel in the region may also soon be awarded scholarships to study the Malay language if they show an interest. In the near future, RTAF may also provide scholarships for local young people to attend school.

Interview with Supalak Kanchanakhundee – NRC does not fail, it just does nothing – translated and summarized from Prachatai.com, week of June 30, 2006

The National Reconciliation Commission (NRC) worked for fifteen months on a report entitled "Unite to Fight Violence." To date, the report has yet to be widely discussed despite being authored by fifty respected people from various fields.

Supalak Kanchanakhundee from The Nation has studied problems in the southern border provinces for ten years. He agrees with the way the NRC identifies problems caused by cultural diversities and identity in the south. However, their proposed solutions to the problems are insufficient. Supalak said that the administrative structure of the three southernmost provinces should be beefed up. He suggested the establishment of special administrative zones to solve problems resulting from a lack of identity within the Melayu Muslim community in the deep south.

The NRC did propose the establishment of a strategic peace building center. But Supalak believes the center will end up being just a center for government officials that does not really help solve problems in the region, as was the case with the Southern Border Provinces Administrative Center. Supalak said that the NRC did not study leading militants or major incidents such as Krue Se and Tak Bai. The NRC says it wants to negotiate with the militants, but Supalak wonders how the agency could communicate without knowing anything about them. The NRC cannot distinguish between the Pattani United Liberation Organization (PULO) and the Barisan Revolusi Nasional Melayu Pattani (BRN) and lacks understanding of the new generation of assailants. The NRC, in fact, considers the militants to be criminals and does not actually want to talk to them.

Agencies working on problems in the deep south should focus on the trust of the local people towards the government. Supalak said that the NRC does not build trust, but causes disagreements and suggests they should be sincere and transparent. The NRC also does not provide enough information to the public about problems in the southernmost provinces. Supalak further doubts the practicability of armed forces and feels they should be composed of people who know Islam, understand local people and can master the art of rhetoric. Supalak advised that certain proposed solutions should be implemented and one of which is making Melayu an official language in the provinces. But he still does not know what the government will actually do to ease problems in the region.

Monitoring the RKK group – Commits 6,000 crimes in one year – translated and summarized from *Matichon*, June 23, 2006

The name RKK has been mentioned many times during the southern unrest. Executive officials, including Commander-in-Chief Pol. Gen. Sonthi Boonyaratglin, Fourth Army regional commander Ongkorn Thongprasom, Region 9 Police Commander Adul Saengsingkaew, and Region 9 Police Deputy Commander Worapong Chiewpreecha, claim that those who commit crimes in the south are members of the RKK group.

After more than fifty crimes had occurred in the three southern border provinces during June 15 and 16, PM Thaksin Shinawatra said that the RKK group was behind the incidents.

What is the RKK exactly? Information from the intelligence unit shows that RKK stands for Runda Kumpulan Kecil, which is a small commando group...

It is believed that the RKK group dominates 500 villages in the three southern provinces with six RKK members in each. There are in total 3,000 RKK members ready to commit crimes in the three southernmost provinces. Groups of five to eight members are trained at a time in 10 to 60 days. It has been found that the trained groups are required to commit at least one crime every month. If all groups follow the target, 6,000 crimes will be committed annually. Coincidentally, RKK is also the name of Indonesian specially trained fighters called Runda Kumpulan Kecil.

Senators and academics complain about government's handling of southern terror – translated and summarized from *Komchadluek*, June 21, 2006

...Panithan (Professor Panithan Wattanayagorn of Chulalongkorn University's Faculty of Political Science) went on to comment, "The current situation is gradually becoming more like a civil war. The recent occurrence of 50 bomb attacks in a single day indicates that the current security measures are ineffective. The government also claimed to know in advance the date on which these attacks would occur, but failed to take any kind of action". Panithan also complained that the southern crisis was still a major headache for the country, despite the unrest having been underway for over two years.

He continued, "The situation in Southern Thailand has been categorized as having the same root causes as the unrest in East Timor and Aceh. The south's proximity to these territories makes it almost certain that it shares the same terrorist ringleaders with them. Although many believe that the issue in Southern Thailand is not primarily a separatist one, it is inevitable that the

government's reaction to the continuing unrest will be closely observed by other nations." Delegates of the Islamic Organization Convention (IOC) have also recently complained about the government's handling of the problems in Thailand's three southernmost provinces. Other international organizations are starting to pay attention to the unrest in the south as they are concerned that the situation there might intensify to become even more severe than that which has occurred in Sri Lanka and Indonesia in recent years.

Official calls report on deal to import rice from Thailand incorrect – www.mehrnews.ir, June 26, 2006 There is no reason to import 800,000 tons of rice from Thailand to Iran and the reports suggesting such an agreement has been made are illogical, Deputy Commerce Minister Mohammad Sadeq Mofatteh said here on Monday.

The Bangkok Post's recent article in which this was reported is incorrect, Mofatteh stated. The nation's total rice imports amount to only 650,000 tons per annum and over 350,000 tons have already entered the country since the Iranian New Year (March 21, 2006), he added.

<u>Iran agrees to Thai rice price</u> – Bangkok Post, June 26, 2006

Iran has agreed to buy 800,000 tonnes of 100% cent white rice from the Thai private sector this year. Pranee Siripan, director of the Foreign Trade Departments Grain and Conformity Trade Bureau, did not provide details of the deal. Recently, Iran has been trying to drive a hard bargain with Thai sellers. She said the rice price was not a problem as Iran is not facing financial difficulties.

Mrs Pranee said Iran has already imported 55-60 per cent of the total rice volume it agreed to purchase from Thailand in the first half of this year.

Mrs Pranee said Iranian importers have confidence in the quality of Thai rice and therefore have agreed to buy it more from Thai exporters despite the fact that the prices were higher than that produced by other countries, such as Vietnam. (via Thaisnews)

More on the destruction of the Phra Prom statue – March 23, 2006 From a plaque at the Erawan Shrine site exactly as it is written: At the end of the year 1955, the union of the Thai Hotel and Tourism Company Limited, the founder of the Erawan Hotel was told by Rear Admiral Luan Suwichanphaet, who specialized on astrology, that the original moment for laying the foundation stone of the Erawan Hotel was not really right auspicious moment, it must be corrected by building a shrine of the Thao Maha Brahma and a spirit house in the area of the hotel. Then a shrine with the image of the Thao Maha Brahma and a spirit house were built followed the advice. The image was a sculpture in plaster covered with gold leaf, which was designed and sculpted by Mr. Chit Phimkowit, a sculptor of the Fine Arts Department. It was brought to enshrine there since the 9th November, 1956. And a worship ceremony of the image has been held on the 9th November of every year.


The unprotected intersection – March 22, 2006

<u>Thaksin's party gets all 36 seats of Bangkok constituencies</u> – Xinhua, April 3, 2006

According to the latest results of ballots issued on Monday, the Thai Rak Thai (TRT) Party led by caretaker Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra has got all the 36 seats in Bangkok constituencies. But doubt follows as TRT received fewer votes than abstentions in 28 out of 36 constituencies.

The latest figure released by the Election Committee showed that TRT candidates in Bangkok's 36 constituencies has got 1,234,522 votes, or a 46.9 percent of all the 2,631,200 voters, while the votes of "No vote" raise to 1,319,206, or a proportion of 50.1 percent.

The vote counts showed that the TRT received fewer votes than abstentions in 28 out of 36 constituencies in Bangkok.

Therefore, some analysts doubted that if the higher figure of abstentions means TRT's nonsupporters are more than supporters. But in term of election law of Thailand, TRT has win all the 36 seats in Bangkok legally.

For two days before the election, the press have been predefining the result as "chaos," but on the ground Thaksin will be in the driver's seat.





Tearing down Laksamee Wilas Palace
- February 1, 2006

Wisarut reports: After my investigation, I found that the old house at the corner of Phaythai Intersection is "Laksamee Wilas Palace" of the former Queen Laksamilawan of King Vajiravut (July 3, 1899 – August 29, 1961). She was born MomjaoYing Wanphimon Worawan of Prince Nartadhip Praphanphongse (the founder of the Red Line Tram and Phraphutthabat Railway).

This palace came from the money from the will of King Vajiravut since she received only 12,000 baht annual payment from the Royal Household Office and stayed in the palace at the end of Soi Phrom Phong (Sukhumvit 39 when it had not become a shortcut yet) without servants. Even when she lived in the new palace, she rarely met with anybody—not even her own siblings and relatives (the Worawan family).

Laksamee Wilas Palace is also the place where the former Queen Laksamilawan met the tragic end of her life. She was murdered by her own gardeners with an axe and a steel crowbar on August 29, 1961. Her secretary (a junior student at the Accountant and Commence Department, Chulalongkorn University) discovered the decomposed body of former Queen Laksamilawan at the garage of Laksamee Wilas Palace on September 3, 1961. She was cremated at the crematorium at Wat Debsirin on October 1961.

Police speedily arrested two gardeners for the murder. Both of them admitted that they murdered the former Queen Laksamilawan since they could not endure the continuing curses of the old lady since she was so self-centered, so moody and so pushy that nobody wanted to become her maids, butlers or servants. The gardeners were sentenced to death by a Military Court since it was a time under Martial Law, but the sentence was commuted to life and they were pardoned years later.

Today, Laksamee Wilas Palace is becoming history since the new owner want to demolish it to erase the tragedy from the place. Even today, nobody care about this old palace and noodle stalls are set up in front of the derelict palace.

Indian wages are also relatively low, beginning at about \$2 a day for factory jobs. That compares with a minimum of \$3.50 to \$4.50 a day in Thailand, depending on the area, and the \$4 to \$8 that some Chinese workers are beginning to command as labor shortages spread.

China is not in any immediate danger of falling behind, however. Its exports exceed India's by several multiples, and the gap keeps widening. In 2005, India's exports were worth about \$8 billion a month, and China's, \$63 billion, with manufactured goods the bulk of both countries' exports. Experts say the two countries will occupy different positions in the vast market for offshore manufacturing. The first wave of low-cost manufacturing to be sent overseas – the making of toys, electric kettles and television sets, among other wares – will remain out of India's reach because of the difficulty of running Indian factories as large as Chinese ones. Official paperwork and regulation is still sticky here, and power still costs about twice as much...

"Three years ago, there was no encroachment. This excludes land title deed conflicts, as that is beyond our legal power," said Pratya Thangchan, head of the suppression unit of Mu Koh Chang National Park. Technically, land not in use must be classified as forest land under the Forest Act of 1941 and any forest land encroachment must be investigated. But in most cases officers failed to capture the real culprits, he said. As soon as the government launched the asset capitalisation policy, under which land title deeds are issued more rapidly, several developers approached police with title deeds in their hands.

"Once they have land documents, we can't take any legal action and the case must be closed," the official said...

Encroachment tactics vary depending on the type of land. People wanting to occupy forest or public land prepare documents that indicate land use while hiring workers to clear the land.

If police cannot arrest land encroachers in 30 days, they have to close the case. The encroachers later seek to upgrade the land documents to title deeds.

People wanting to own mangrove forest land have clay dykes built in target areas to keep seawater away for about four months, causing plants to wither and die.

Once the dead trees are cleared, they then make false claims that the land was once a rice field with Sor Kor 1 land ownership papers. After a while, they apply for title deeds.

Encroachers on coastal land usually occupy land near beaches. They fill in land next to the beaches, which is public land, and claim it as their own even though the law requires all structures to be built no less than 20m away.

Public access to beaches is now hard to find. Only two public routes lead to Hat Sai Khao beach where many resorts are located. Some businessmen who block the public route even charge 50 baht for people to pass through...

The average price of land on the beach is now 15 million baht per rai, up from 300,000-400,000 baht 10 years ago, and 1.5-3 million baht along the only main road...

The latest figure released by the Election Committee showed that TRT candidates in Bangkok's 36 constituencies has got 1,234,522 votes, or a 46.9 percent of all the 2,631,200 voters, while the votes of "No vote" raise to 1,319,206, or a proportion of 50.1 percent.

The vote counts showed that the TRT received fewer votes than abstentions in 28 out of 36 constituencies in Bangkok.

Therefore, some analysts doubted that if the higher figure of abstentions means TRT's nonsupporters are

more than supporters. But in term of election law of Thailand, TRT has win all the 36 seats in Bangkok legally.

The new measures would also be in place for the April 19 senate election to help voters, he said, especially given the high number of candidates vying for a seat...
