#### The Snuffing Out of Local Democracy in Malaysia

... Most Malaysians today are probably unaware that vibrant local level democracy existed in the 1950s and 1960s. We had 373 local authorities that had well over 3,000 elected representatives out of a total of some 4,223 local councillors. This number excluded those of the Kuala Lumpur municipality, which came under a separate jurisdiction because it was the federal capital.

The three most prominent municipalities were George Town, Ipoh and Malacca. Elsewhere, there were 37 town councils, 37 town boards, 289 local councils and 7 district councils. Penang and Malacca were the two states which had local councils state-wide and only Penang had fully elective councils throughout its territory on both the island and the mainland...

...Eventually the right to elect leaders of local authorities was taken away when the Local Government Act 1976 was passed by the Parliament thus abolishing local government elections. 







#### The Lee Kuan Yew-Thaksin Connection

In 2006, the multi-billion dollar sale of Thaksin's businesses to a Singaporean holding company finally sparked mass protests against him. Before this, Thaksin has long looked to the Singaporean success story as a model for his own reshaping of Thai politics.

During his time in power, Thaksin was viewed as an emerging regional leader when both Lee Kuan Yew and Mahatir were fading from the political scene.

Thaksin sent troops to Iraq and also assisted in the U.S. rendition of suspected terror suspects. This bolder and more visible foreign activity marked a switch from the disinterested foreign policy Thais had traditionally practiced for self-preservation.

Thaksin state visits to Singapore or Malaysia often resulted in edicts related to what he had seen there—Thailand must build the highest airport control tower in the world or look into Singaporean-style road toll systems for the inner city.

The Singaporean election model was also defended several times by Thaksin-directed political parties. This is the idea that <u>"provinces which vote for the Thai Rak Thai party will be taken good care of first."</u>

Thaksin defended his absorption of existing political parties and <u>pressure on the media</u> by noting that <u>Singapore was successful and did not need a strong opposition</u>. The desire for Thailand to reach Singaporean levels of development <u>was part of Thai Rak Thai Party dogma</u>.

After his ouster, Thaksin continued to meet with the <u>prime minister of Singapore and was treated as if he</u> were still the <u>Thai prime minister</u>.

Lee Kuan Yew was apparently a Thaksin admirer and explained the Thai political situation on Thaksin terms—Thaksin was a reformer who wanted only to help the poor, the army upset his good work, and Thaksin was destined to return (here and here).

It should not be hard to understand Thaksin's (and his peers') adoration of Singapore. Traveling from a nation like Thailand into Singapore or Malaysia presents an obvious contrast of development. The rule of Thailand is that no new law is ever enforced for long and everything always reverts back to an equilibrium all sides can accept without losing face. In other words, nothing can every really be changed in the Thai world. Political parties traditionally formed broad fragile coalitions with little chance of reforming anything.

Compare this to Singapore. There a single party yokes all parts of the state, along with the business world and the media, to ensure that it can nimbly enact whatever is needed without facing the petrification that exists in the Thai world.

The reality may be that the Singaporean system may only work so well because of nation-state's small size (it is really a small city, rather than a country) as well as its strategic location. However, the contrast between authoritarian Singaporean and laissez-faire Thailand are noted throughout the region (for instance, Rangoon's Future: Orderly Singapore or Disorderly Bangkok?).

Even when the generals ruled, the Thai press was freer than its counterparts in "democratic" Malaysia and Singapore...





2009: The Forgotten Red Shirt Siege of Bangkok

The 2009 Red Shirt siege of Bangkok, which brought the city to a halt, was largely overshadowed by the events of 2010 and Pheu Thai's subsequent election win. Without any protester deaths, and with the protest site off-limits to the media and foreign bloggers, there was little international awareness of the events after the collapse of the ASEAN summit in Pattaya.

The 2009 protest was designed to be quick and surgical with small numbers of highly organized men committing acts to shake the resolve of the government.

The overall message was revolution. Thaksin openly cheered on protesters in video linkups. Revolutionary decrees were read from the stage such as one assuring the populace that any law could be broken in the effort of the people to take back the country.

Besides overrunning the ASEAN summit and causing foreign leaders to flee, the Prime Minister's car was attacked in Pattaya and later in Bangkok, and hostages were taken and displayed on the Red Shirt stage. The Red Shirt leaders repeatedly emphasized that the people were so angry that they could take out their frustration on any interlopers so foreigners and reporters were warned to stay away from the protest site. This limited international coverage and sympathy for the protest.

While some of the events took place around Victory Monument and there were other scattered incidents around town, the main protest area settled in the traditional protest spot at Government House far downtown. Scattered burning buses carried out by small bands of highly organized men and the gas trucks rigged to explode near the Huay Kwang flats had little impact in winning the hearts and minds of the public. What the "protest" actually was for was very clear—it was direct force exerted by a disgruntled politician against the government. In the past, such action had been threatened by political figures such as former PM Chavalit Yongchaiyudh and Democrat Suthep Thaugsuban, but Thaksin finally made it a reality.

The deaths the protest were supposed to produce—to invoke the Thai convention that a government that kills people must step aside—did not materialize. This did not stop Thaksin from afterwards insisting to perplexed

Western reporters there were many deaths at the hands of the military.

The Red Shirt protests the following year in 2010 displayed a bottom-up rethinking of the entire event and ended up being more successful.

First, Thaksin kept his distance. Notwithstanding fiery rhetoric from the stage and some violent threats from Seh Daeng, the 2010 protests were not overtly revolutionary, but emphasized the call for new democratic elections instead.

In 2009 the protesters were made up of cells of organized men—with older women making up most of the protesters at the main protest site at Government House. In contrast, the 2010 protests were massive and diverse to drive home the idea that all the people wanted new elections. Instead of holding the protests far downtown, they ended up being centered in Rajaprasong where they could not be ignored.

Most importantly, in 2010 the Red Shirts welcomed the press and foreigners and attempted to maintain a friendly and non-violent image towards them on the ground. This resulted in an extraordinary amount of foreign press coverage in the midst of smiling and cheering Red Shirts—a compelling image for the international media. Bloggers, this time being welcome, dutifully posted photos and comments and put a human rural face on the event.

# The First Siege of Bangkok: Thaksin Tells Protesters Not to Leave Bangkok Empty-Handed

The most interesting part of the 2009 siege of Bangkok (<u>largely forgotten in subsequent years</u>) was that Thaksin himself narrated it.

With Shinawatra family members safely out of the country, Thaksin denounced Privy Councillor Prem as the "influential person" behind his ousting and insisted that the Red Shirts must not leave Bangkok "empty-handed." Later he brought up what is now Red Shirt dogma—that the UDD is achieving "true democracy."

Decrees from the Red Shirt protest stage in Bangkok set a deadline for Prem to resign from the Privy Council while members of the Taxi Community Radio Club threatened that they would use 20,000 taxis to block all intersections in Bangkok if the government did not step down.

The Royal Thai Police sent their message of loyalty to Thaksin as well, allowing the lone suspect captured after the attack on the prime minister's car to "go outside for a cigarette." He never returned.



News that former DSI chief Tharit has had his assets seized (<u>NACC seizes assets of ex-DSI chief</u> and <u>Tarit confident he can defend assets</u>) may signal the end of the career of one of the most openly opportunistic functionaries in recent Thai political history.

The Department of Special Investigation (DSI) was conceived in the 1997 constitution as an independent organization to get around the Royal Thai Police's institutionalized corruption. The Thai police's politicization strangled the fair filing of cases and influenced decisions about what would be investigated as a crime.

Thaksin's era as prime minister, in particular, demonstrated how control of the police force by one of his relatives or other cronies was key to wielding political power without legal repercussions.

Tharit Pengdit, as director of the Department Special Investigation, remains a symbol of how politics ate away at hopes that any Thai organization could remain impartial.

Tharit is known for dramatically changing according to the political wind—<u>aggressively bringing cases</u> <u>against the Red Shirts during one government</u> and then dropping them to go after Democrat Party leaders in another. He even personally cleared Thaksin's hand-picked candidate for Bangkok Governor in an unusual Sunday press conference.

In many cases, the charges brought by the DSI were timed for political leverage. For instance, the opposition was obliquely warned in 2012 that they risked being charged as revenge for blocking Thaksin amnesty. After refusing to lift their objections, Democrat Party leaders were harried with charge after charge including long-dormant questions about Abhisit's nationality.

This was a signal to all that a sitting government could still use investigations and criminal charges—as Thaksin was renowned for doing—to influence and punish its enemies.

Tharit's fawning conduct towards whoever was in power marked the DSI as yet another political weapon to wield against whoever was in the opposition.







Gen. Chavalit is the only major Thai military figure who speaks up for Thaksin. His experience as both a former commander-in-chief and prime minister makes his pronouncements consequential.

His involvement is meant to demonstrate that there is rift in the military regarding support for the coup and support for Thaksin. Such a rift is what Red Shirts have long claimed, particularly as they staged protests in Bangkok in 2009 and 2010.

From <u>leading a Red Shirt "People's Army" against the Thai military</u> to his brief support of reconciliation efforts, he has repeatedly <u>flip flopped on his support for Thaksin and the Red Shirts</u>, making him a frequent target of ridicule in the Thai-language media.

Due to his sympathies towards both Thaksin and the Red Shirts, Gen. Chavalit has long been suspected (and sometimes unfairly blamed) of carrying out attacks on behalf of Thaksin's political goals, from the Bangkok New Year's bombings in 2006 to the recent Samui car bomb.

In the 1990s he was lionized by the international press as a laudable example of the future of Thai politics. Unlike previous Thai generals who entered politics through coups, Chavalit was one Thai commander-inchief who became prime minister by leading a political party and winning an election. Unfortunately, his ineptitude in managing the economy sparked the baht collapse of 1997 and the ensuing worldwide financial panic.

Chavalit once famously boasted that he could "blow a whistle" and the country would be in flames, giving voice to the threat that he could rouse rural supporters to pour into Bangkok and create havoc. This is not an uncommon Thai threat and has been voiced by a range of politicians from Thaksin Shinawatra to Suthep Thaugsuban.

Chavalit was recently accused of being behind the car bomb attack in Samui–not only because he is one of the "usual suspects" for bombings, but because he supposedly had a meeting with insurgents in the Thai Deep South. His aides denied this report which spread through social media.

His promised recent appearance on the Red Shirt "Peace TV" station is thought to be a possible reason the junta revoked the station's license. This is because, whether or not Chavalit was behind the recent bombings, he is a potent symbol to Red Shirts as he demonstrates that, just as their dogma states, the military is deeply divided and is in large part loyal to Thaksin.

The Naewna cartoon (at top) ridicules 82-year-old Chavalit's effectiveness, comparing him to a dead floating dog in a river (this is a Thai saying to indicate a powerless, useless thing).

The cartoonist ridicules the threat of Chavalit and his bombings and says his influence is already dead. Floating in the river refers to a time when Chavalit was prime minister and he vowed to solve poverty in the Northeast region (known as Isan) or he would jump into the Mekong river.
